# Brand new chapter at Crown Street

An exciting new chapter is set to begin at Darlington Libraries' main branch in Crown Street.

September will see the doors open to the public following work to not only restore the building and make it fit for purpose, but also modernise the service for the 21st century.

The ambitious project has been shortlisted in the 'conservation regeneration' category of the prestigious **Construction Excellence North** East Awards 2023. The winner



is due to be revealed later this month, so fingers crossed!

The council has worked alongside contractors Hodgson & Sayers, Lytestream Electrical Engineers & Contractors Ltd, Twin Services, Crocker Plasterers, Contract Flooring and Mitie. We also received £225,000 from Arts Council England to support what digital services we offer.

The first phase of the work is now nearing completion with the lending library transformed into a majestic space with light flooding in from the roof lights and windows, while the original shelving has been restored.



The refurbished children's library will open up a world of imagination for families in a safe and nurturing environment. Themed around an enchanted woodland, it's a mix of contemporary and traditional décor.

Another stand-out feature is The Study. Set among our non-fiction collection, it has large tables allowing customers to meet others, or work independently at desks or on computers.

Phase two focused on the Art Gallery and Centre for Local Studies and aimed to improve the customer experience and ensure our collection is accessible to visitors. New areas are being created to entice

new, diverse audiences,

including The Reminiscence Room for older people and those with dementia; The Hoskins Room for group meetings; and The Hive, an entire section dedicated to creativity, robotics, and digital technology. This will ensure the library continues as a centre of education, learning, and enjoyment, just as its visionary, Edward Pease intended.

#### **Skinnergate and the Yards**

Shop front and property upgrades, new planting and improvements to the public areas of the Yards and Skinnergate have brought a new sense of identity to the area, helping to make them a fantastic social space for people visiting the independent retailers.

More shop fronts will be improved this summer and plans are underway to transform Skinnergate into a pedestrian and cycle-friendly street with a vibrant atmosphere to encourage people to visit and stay in the area, boosting footfall for the many businesses.



#### Northgate

A project which aims to rebuild and regenerate a historic area of town connected to our railway history, while at the same time improving social and economic outcomes for local residents.

The creation of the Rail Heritage Quarter, which is also being supported by the Towns Fund, is well underway (see page 36).

We are working with the community and progressing a number of significant projects in the area, including buying the listed building at 156 Northgate, formerly used as a restaurant, which will be transformed into office space to support small businesses.



#### Victoria Road

Work will begin this summer on a programme of updated shop fronts and street improvements, like those in Skinnergate and the Yards.

This will smarten up the street and make it a welcoming route between the train station and the town centre.

A project to improve the pavements and the layout of the road, including new safety features and green space, is already complete.



#### The adult skills project, Priestgate

Work is underway to create a dedicated adult skills centre, supported by the council's Learning and Skills team and Darlington College.

The centre will offer adults of all ages the opportunity to pick up new skills and qualifications, whether to upskill, enter a new industry or re-enter the workforce after a break.

Additional high-quality office space is also planned for the upper floors of the historic building.



#### **T-levels at Darlington College**

A big success story for the Towns Fund was the opening of the new £3m Ingenium Centre, based at Darlington College. The centre will teach students skills in new green industries such as electric vehicle repair, robotics and wind energy and allow them to experience the technology of the jobs of tomorrow while gaining a qualification.

This is an exciting time for the college and for the young people in Darlington, who now have a wealth of education and training options open to them in industries of the future on their doorstep.

# **NHS 75**

As the NHS celebrates its 75th anniversary, it's difficult to imagine life without a national health service, particularly given the vital role it played in confronting the Covid-19 pandemic which was an unprecedented challenge. At the same time, NHS staff stepped up to plan and deliver our vaccination programme – making the UK one of the first in the world to do so.

As we commemorate this landmark birthday, these achievements are only the most recent in a long list of impressive facts and figures from the last seven and a half decades. Let's remind ourselves of a few of them:

When health secretary, Aneurin Bevan, launched the NHS on 5 July 1948, it was the climax of a hugely ambitious plan to bring good healthcare to all. For the first time, hospitals, doctors, nurses, pharmacists, opticians and dentists were brought together under one umbrella organisation to provide services that are free for all at the point of delivery. Financing it through taxation means people pay into it according to their means.

In one move, and on a single day, the NHS took control of 480,000 hospital beds in England and Wales, making 125,000 nurses, 5,000 consultants and a budget of £437m available to care for patients.

The figures remain impressive. The NHS now employs more than 1.2 million people - including almost 124,000 hospital doctors, 300,000 nurses and over 36,000 GPs - and has a budget of over £153bn.





# Leading the way

The UK is a world leader in medical research and County Durham & Darlington NHS Foundation Trust has a very proactive research team that makes sure we're involved in cutting edge studies so our patients can benefit from the latest medications, investigations and other treatments. The NHS and scientific discovery go hand in hand.

MRI scanners weren't developed until 1980 and only became widely available in the 1990s. We're delighted that at CDDFT we have three of the most modern MRI scanners available.

When patients require surgery, they're increasingly likely to have a laparoscopic procedure, requiring a much smaller incision, leading to quicker and better recovery. We have a dedicated laparoscopic theatre at University Hospital of North Durham, with the latest technology, and at Darlington Memorial Hospital, we've recently begun using a stateof-the-art surgical robot that enables surgeons to perform more precise, minimally invasive surgery using 3D vision.

# Living longer, living better



## Average life expectancy in the UK is currently 81.7 years – up from 69.2 years in the 1950s.

One consequence of living longer is that more of us will benefit from a joint replacement. The first hip replacement was carried out in 1962 and at CDDFT we perform almost 1,000 hip and knee joint replacements annually.

We're also caring for more of our patients at home, avoiding the disruption of hospital admission wherever possible. During the last year, our district nurses have delivered over 600,000 appointments.

During the pandemic, digital technology continued to transform the care of many patients, who could be monitored remotely from home by a number of our services, including for those taking Warfarin who require regular monitoring. In the last year we have also introduced an electronic patient record system, giving clinicians up to the minute patient information.

At CDDFT, we're constantly looking for the next innovation and as the needs of the 650,000 people we serve change, we'll be spearheading the drive to ensure patients receive the right care, first time, every time.

- **2014** The 111 phone service is launched nationally.
- **20/21** The UK is one of the first countries to roll out a COVID-19 vaccination programme across its whole population.

# Sports complex revamp taking shape

Ambitious plans to turn Eastbourne Sports Complex into one of the Tees Valley's premier outdoor grassroots sports venues are starting to take shape.

Work is well underway to create a new reception area and resurface the main running track, so it will once again be able to host premier athletic events.

The work also includes a new artificial grass pitch with changing rooms, turnstiles and access for up to 200 spectators.

Local football clubs will be able to play up to Step 5 on the National League Pyramid, with over 500 participants a week able to play on the pitch once work is completed.

Work on the track is expected to be completed shortly, with the all-weather pitch set to be ready later in the summer.

Eastbourne Sports Complex, which is managed by the council, worked with the Football Foundation and the County Durham FA to secure a £941,842 grant towards the project.

#### A team of children's social workers has scooped a top prize at a national awards ceremony.

The council's family group conference team won team of the year at the recent Frontline Awards, run by England's biggest social work charity, Frontline.

Judges were pleased with the team's commitment to putting children at the centre of plans for their care and making sure their thoughts and wishes are captured and heard.

Families are also closely involved in the conferences, with some even taking the lead on designing their own care plans with support from social workers.

Everyone on the team brings their own area of expertise from drug and alcohol services to housing and education. The outcomes for families have been outstanding, with 94% of the conferences supporting a child to return to their family from care and 97% of families supported to help themselves and so they avoid, or reduce, intervention.

Team manager Brooke Fenwick said: "We are committed to supporting children, young people and families to be at the heart of decision making and it is amazing to see the outcomes that a family group conference can help them achieve.

"This is a credit to the families that we support and how they embrace the opportunity to work in this way, and our team of passionate individuals who support them to do so."

It's the latest piece of good news for the council's children's services teams, which were last year rated good by inspection body Ofsted.



Frontline aims to make life better for the 700,000 children across the UK every year whose family need the support of a social worker - to help keep them safe from harm and to give them every possible chance to fulfil their potential. It does this through developing excellent social work practice, leadership and innovation.

The charity held the awards to mark its 10-year anniversary, to celebrate the amazing work being done by social workers and the

achievements of the young people they support.

Frontline chief executive Mary Jackson said: "It's social workers like these that make a real difference to the social work system, and crucially to the children and families it supports.

"This award to the Darlington family group conference team is well-deserved for the team's commitment to involving children and families in designing their own care and support. It has some excellent outcomes to show for its focus on the needs of each family, and the broad range of experience it brings to every conference.

"We're delighted to be able to celebrate the fantastic work being done by so many children's social workers."

Children who need a social worker frequently live in the toughest circumstances, often because their family is struggling with multiple challenges like mental ill-health, domestic abuse, poverty or other external pressures. Social workers can change this. The support, commitment and protection they give to these children, and their families, can help them turn things around and give them hope for a brighter future.



# Improving your roads this summer

Residential roads and rural routes around the town will be improved this summer, with a £2.5m programme of resurfacing, repairs and micro-asphalting works planned.

The 2023 summer programme will include seven resurfacing schemes totalling 1.86km of road length, including Feethams roundabout, Barnes Road in Mowden, Burnside Road in Firthmoor and Neasham Road.

There will also be a widespread programme of structural patching across the town, amounting to 2.738km of road surface.

We carry out surveys of the road and footpath network annually and this condition data is used to prioritise which schemes will be added to the summer programme of works. The funding for this year's highways maintenance schemes includes £388,000 awarded by the Government from its 2023-24 pothole fund.

The programme also includes schemes, covering 1.5km of road surface, that will be carried out using a more eco-friendly in situ recycling process, which recycles the existing carriageway material and saves on the cost of new materials and landfill, as well as reducing the number of vehicle movements. Towards the end of summer, the micro-asphalt programme will be carried out on 31 streets across the town, which seals the road surface to prevent water damage and extend its life by up to 10 years, covering 5.595km.

All roadworks schemes are planned to minimise disruption on our road network and larger schemes are planned during the school holidays, when there can be up to 15% less traffic at rush hour. There are also a number of improvement schemes planned by gas and electricity companies – these works are programmed, where possible, to run alongside our own to minimise disruption.

## Don't Contribute to the Problem

Becky's usual spot was the Commercial Street car park close to the pay point. She sat there for a few hours most days, whatever the weather, wrapped in an old blanket, helpfully advising about parking costs.

"Push the green button," she'd say, starting a conversation as she explained she'd been thrown out by her family, lost her children, and had been sleeping rough for months because no one cares. All she wanted was some money to buy a hot drink, some food, or a bus ticket to see her kids.

But Becky wasn't homeless. She was alcohol dependent and needed the money for drink.

Today Becky is sober, has reunited with her family and is rebuilding bridges with her kids. Talk to her now and she will tell you how grateful she is to those who supported her into recovery. She is grateful to her family for giving her another chance, and thanks those who did not give her money when she asked for it, choosing instead to give to a charity to help her.

#### Because you said no

- the money that sustained and deepened Becky's dependency stopped flowing.

**Because you said no** - Becky has a chance of living beyond her 50s, a chronic drinker's life expectancy.

Because you said no - Becky faced the grim reality of her alcohol dependency and took back control of her life.

**Because you said no** - Becky abandoned her pitch in Commercial Street, and no longer targeted people for money which made things worse for her rather than better.

**Because you said no** - she is no longer out in all weathers begging. She is healthier, happier and has regained her self-esteem.

Because you said no - Becky has a future.

In Darlington we have a multi-agency partnership working to help people like Becky. Support is offered on a daily basis, with the guiding principle that everything done is in the person's best interests, including any enforcement action by the police. By addressing the needs of those who beg, and because of your help, the number of people begging here is very low. Help us to keep it that way.

Thank you for helping Becky and saying no.

#### As the weather warms up it's tempting to take a dip in our rivers and lakes, but sadly more than 300 people accidentally drown in the UK every year.

We're working to raise awareness of the dangers around open water and are backing Drowning Prevention Week (17-24 June), an annual campaign run by the Royal Life Saving Society UK to help you enjoy water safely this summer.

Please think twice before taking the plunge and talk to your children about water safety.

Remember:

- don't let your children go near water without an adult who can point our dangers and get help if someone gets into trouble
- never jump in or suddenly immerse yourself in cold water as the shock could kill you, enter slowly into shallow water
- look out for warning signs and follow their instructions

- supervision saves lives so stay together never swim alone, always go with friends or family and, if you can, swim where there are lifeguards
- don't drink alcohol if you are going into water and avoid walking near water if you've been drinking
- if you fall in the water, don't panic extend your arms and legs and extend your arms and legs so you float and shout for help
- learn how to help if you see someone in difficulty

   don't enter the water, shout for help, call 999 and
  throw them something that floats
- learn basic water safety, rescue and CPR skills
- download the what3words app on your phone to help give emergency services your exact location so they can reach you quickly. Find out more www.what3words.com

# **Preventing illegal sales of vapes to children**

Tobacco smoking remains our biggest preventable killer, with up to two thirds of people who smoke dying early as result of their addiction. Vapes offer a significantly less harmful alternative to smoking and are very effective in helping people to quit.

However, vaping is not recommended for people who don't smoke or for young people under 18.

There are growing concerns about sales of illegal and over-strength vapes not permitted in the UK. It's an issue our trading standards and public health teams are working with police and other partners to tackle.

Shaun Trevor, trading standards and animal health manager, explained: "With the help of information from parents and other residents, we've led a series of days of action to clamp down on illegal sales, with more than £70,000 worth of products seized so far this year.

"This has resulted in at least two shops being the subject of temporary closure orders and investigations are ongoing with a view to prosecutions. Recently we also sent two disposable Elux Bar Legend 3500 vapes for laboratory testing. The results showed they were misdescribed as 0% nicotine, and withdrawal notices have been given to two retailers under the General Product Safety Regulations 2005.

"We will continue to work with police and our partners to tackle this issue and would urge anyone with information to get in touch."

Nationally, the government has pledged £3 million to support efforts to tackle the issue and there are also calls that vapes should be out of sight and out of reach of children in shops.

Ken Ross, public health principal, said: "It's illegal to sell vapes to children and we're working hard to crack down on such sales in our area, but there are also concerns that brands are using child-friendly packaging with the names of popular sweet treats such as banana milkshake and jelly babies to attract them.

"We are working with schools and colleges so they have the resources available to help ensure young people know the facts about vaping."

# Darlington's £140m station upgrade being driven forward at car parks

The £140million redevelopment of Darlington railway station is continuing at speed, with work now under way to create its new multistorey car park.

Late last year, the first buildings were demolished to the east of the station to make way for the new development – including the Exhaust A Fix garage, flattened by local firm Thompsons.

Since then, this demolition programme has ramped up, with the east side of the station now ready to enter the next phase of works.

As part of this, in April, the station's eastern car park – accessed from Neasham Road – was closed to allow construction of this new multistorey and gateway entrance to begin. A temporary car park at the former Cattle Market site off Clifton Road to the west is now open. To the west of the Station, the demolition of the former Hogan's Pub is now complete, paving the way for a safer and improved modern landscape, to enable better bus connections.

Within the station, three new platforms will accommodate current services and improve rail connections both within the Tees Valley and beyond via the East Coast Main Line. The station project has already been primed with £33million from the Tees Valley Combined Authority and Tees Valley Mayor Ben Houchen. A further £93million investment was rubber stamped late last year to take total Government funding to £105million.

# **Regeneration work on track at Rail Heritage Quarter**

Work to transform the Head of Steam Railway Museum into a multi-million pound visitor attraction in time for the 2025 bicentenary of the Stockton and Darlington Railway is steaming ahead.

The main museum building and the nearby goods shed, the oldest surviving building of its type in the UK, have been cleared and stripped by contractors ready for renovations to begin.

Both buildings will be transformed, with the railway museum brought to life using digital and technological innovation to tell the story of our railway past, while the goods shed will become the visitor centre, welcoming guests from around the world to the heritage site.
