Get ready to have your say in elections

In May next year, residents will go to the polls to elect a police and crime commissioner for the Durham Constabulary area and a mayor for the Tees Valley Combined Authority.

The Elections Act 2022 introduced some new rules which will be in place for next year's elections. As at the local government elections earlier this year, you will need to show photo ID when voting at a polling station. Photo ID includes a passport or driving licence - a full list of suitable documents can be found at www.electoralcommission.org.uk and will be on your poll card.

Voters with disabilities will be given extra support at polling stations and anyone over the age of 18 can accompany a disabled voter at a polling station.

Other changes include:

- If you're applying for a postal vote or proxy vote, you will need to provide proof of your identity. You can apply online (details can be found on our website).
- If you vote by post, you currently have to refresh your signature every five years. This will be reduced to every three years, to be phased in from January 2024.
- Political parties and campaigners will no longer be permitted to handle postal votes, and you will only be allowed to hand in a maximum of six postal votes at a polling station. You will only be able to act as a proxy for up to four people, and of these, the maximum number who can be domestic electors (voters living in the UK) is two. These changes will come into force for elections from May 2024.

- year limit on voting for British citizens living abroad will end. Any British citizen previously registered to vote in the UK, or who previously lived in the UK, will be able to register to vote, regardless of how long they've lived abroad. British citizens living abroad will no longer have to re-register as an overseas elector every year, this will change to every three years.
- The voting system in all elections for elected mayors, combined authority mayors and police and crime commissioners has changed from the supplementary vote system to the first past the post system.

Plastic bottles

Please remove trigger sprays and pumps before recycling. Recycling one bottle saves enough energy to power a 60W bulb for six hours that's a lot of Christmas sparkle!

02

Plastic chocolate tubs

If you have an annoying relative who puts the empty wrappers back in the tub make sure you empty them out before recycling

03

Aerosol cans

If everyone in the UK recycled one empty aerosol there would be enough energy saved to run a TV in 273,000 homes to catch all those Christmas specials!

04

Foil mince pie cases

Metal can be recycled again and again without losing quality. This includes mince pie cases and foil used in cooking (as long as it's clean)

05

Cans

Whether you're leaving Santa a beer or a refreshing soft drink don't forget to recycle the can! Recycling one can saves enough energy to power a vacuum cleaner for an hour.

06

Cardboard packaging

If you see more of the Amazon delivery driver than your own family you will no doubt have a mountain of cardboard to get rid of. Please remove tape and flatten boxes before recycling.

Glass

Glass is easy to recycle and can be turned into new products again and again. Please give glass bottles and jars a rinse first.



Full steam ahead to 2025!



The two year countdown is on to mark the bicentenary of the birth of the modern railway with celebrations throughout 2025.

The Stockton & Darlington Railway opened on 27 September 1825, connecting places, people, communities and ideas and ultimately transforming the world.

To mark the 200th anniversary of that momentous first journey, three councils, Darlington, Durham and Stockton-on-Tees, plus Tees Valley Combined Authority, have joined forces with a range of local, national, and international partners, to deliver a series of internationally significant projects throughout the bicentenary year.

S&DR200 – a fantastic nine-month festival – is at the heart of the celebrations.

It's all aboard for a programme of events including steam train journeys, exhibitions, visual arts and large-scale spectacles. There'll be something for everyone – from railway enthusiasts and hobbyists to students, families and visitors of all ages.

A permanent walk and cycle pathway, which will closely follow much of the 26-mile inaugural route, is being developed across County Durham, Darlington and Stockton and there are plans to use a replica of Locomotion No.1 to provide experiences inspired by the inaugural journey.

There'll be opportunities to learn and discover at interactive exhibitions and schools will be able to take advantage of a series of S&DR200 focused projects to spark pupils' interest in science, technology, engineering, maths and the arts.

Recognition for work with young people

Work to tackle anti-social behaviour among young people has been recognised by a prestigious awards scheme.

Future Pathways brings together our civic enforcement team, the young people's engagement and justice service and the Darlington neighbourhood police team to offer intervention and positive activities for young people. The work focuses on the young people's personal development as well as restorative work.

The teams received certificates of high commendation at the Nepacs Ruth Cranfield Awards in recognition of their efforts to reduce reoffending.

Tackling shoplifters together

When you're shopping in the town centre look out for the new posters promoting a scheme to crackdown on shoplifting.

The Shop Watch scheme encourages bushinesses to come together to securely share information to help stop potential shoplifters before they get the chance to steal.

Initially 15 town centre business were supplied with radios and phones, thanks to funding from

the Tees Valley Combined Authority, so they could quickly share information about suspicious activity with each other and the police.

The scheme has proved so successful it has been expanded with more than 70 town centre and out of town businesses signing up.

As well as the radio and phone communication, posters have been put in businesses' windows around the town to act as a deterrent.



PROFILE: Missing and exploited team

The team works with difficult to reach vulnerable young people who are at risk of going missing or being sexually, criminally or financially exploited. The team also works closely with families and carers to help young people who have been exploited or have gone missing in the past.

Providing bespoke packages of care, the team works with individual young people and their families or groups to get the best results. They work with organisations and businesses who are not traditionally linked with children's services such as shops, taxi firms, public transport, parks, licensing and takeaways to explore potential risks and make these places safe for young people.

What is child exploitation?

Child exploitation is when a child is used for financial gain, sexual gratification, labour or personal advantage.

Using cruel and violent treatment to force a child to take part in criminal or sexual activities can have a detrimental impact on their physical and mental health, education, and moral or social development. Our team works with children to identify these risks before they become victims of exploitation as well as helping those who have already been harmed.

There are many signs that a child may be being exploited including unusual sexual activity; absence or truancy from home or school; problems at home; poor emotional and physical

health; involvement in gangs; behaviour changes linked to being online; alcohol and drug misuse; receiving unexplained gifts or money; mistrust of authority figures.

Children who go missing

There are a number of reasons why children go missing from home. When a child goes missing, we work with the police and speak to family and friends to try to locate them. When the child is found the team will work with them and their family to identity the reason that they left. Issues can include:

- arguments and conflicts at home
- poor family/carer relationships
- physical and emotional abuse
- wellbeing of the young person or someone who cares for them
- problems with alcohol and/or drugs
- problems at school
- placement instability for looked after children
- grooming for potential sexual exploitation
- pressure from their peer group, a gang or radicalisation group.

Once the issues are identified, our team works with lots of different agencies and organisations to get the young person and their family the help they need to keep everyone safe and free from harm.



Teesside Crowned Airport of the Year at Major Awards

Teesside International Airport has been named UK & Irish Airport of the Year at a major industry ceremony in London.

The airport was handed the prestigious accolade at the TTG Travel Industry Awards, with the publication TTG – the Travel Trade Gazette – celebrating those businesses and travel professionals that have worked the smartest, delivered the best service and experience and have helped champion a fairer travel industry.

A panel of aviation and travel expert judges assessed entries from airports across the country before awarding the gong to Teesside. They recognised the mammoth efforts undertaken to turn Teesside Airport around, including how it had grown its flights and improved the customer experience, is capitalising on its land and assets and has been leading the sector – for example, in becoming the first UK airport to scrap the 100ml liquid limit in security.

As well as this success, Teesside is also in the running for the British Travel Awards' for Best UK Airport, and is the only national airport going up against global competition in the International Airport Review's Airport Experience Award. The honour comes after a hugely successful year for the airport which

has enjoyed its best passenger figures for more than a decade, and one which has seen further investment in the airport terminal and across the entire site.

Teesside – named the UK's second most punctual airport in 2022 – has also now grown to enjoy its largest selection of airlines, schedules and international destinations since it returned to public ownership.



The win came just days after it was announced that SSE Energy Solutions was set to partner with the airport to install a massive solar farm at the airport.

This will see up to 3MW of solar generation to initially meet demand from the airport and its tenants but could ultimately deliver 50MW of capacity over the coming years, making it one of the biggest solar projects in the UK.



Station revamp moves forward

Significant progress is being made on the £139million redevelopment of Darlington Station with large sections of steelworks now in place for the entrance hall and car park.

Network Rail is getting ready to start work on the eastern side to provide two new platforms and a footbridge connecting them to the station building

The new platforms will provide passengers with a better service and more travel options. They will also improve reliability and boost the railway's performance for both local and long-distance high-speed services on the East Coast Main Line.

Internal improvements this autumn will mean some disruption for passengers with a temporary relocation of the ticket machines and revised walking routes round the site. Any inconvenience will be kept to a minimum while the construction teams work to deliver the multi-million-pound upgrade.

NEW DEAL TO BUY CAMPUS LAND AGREED

The establishment of Darlington as a key location for the UK Government has taken a major step forward after the purchase of land for the permanent site of the new Darlington Economic Campus.

The Darlington Economic Campus (DEC) was established in August 2021 and Departments moved into Feethams House in June 2022. It currently houses 600 government staff.

Brunswick Street is the permanent site for the DEC, which is the Treasury's second headquarters and will also accommodate the Department for Business and Trade. Construction of a new government base will begin in October 2024 and is expected to be completed in 2026.

The development will help grow the local economy with 1,139 roles committed to Darlington, and 674 relocated to date. The move of Civil Service roles to Darlington is



expected to generate around £30million per 1,000 roles relocated in economic benefits for the town, down to increased footfall and spending from staff.

The DEC is part of the Government's Places for Growth (PfG) programme, which is moving Civil Service roles out of London to areas across the UK.

The programme will see 22,000 roles move from London by 2030 and is part of ensuring that staff working in government are closer to the people and communities that they serve.

Alongside the Treasury, the campus will house teams from the Department for Business and Trade, the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, the Department for Culture, Media and Sport, the Office for National Statistics and the Competition and Markets Authority.

They will be working alongside the Department for Education who already have a base in Darlington.

Understanding so

Did you know the council spends over two thirds of its budget on social care – helping to look after some of the most vulnerable people in our communities at all stages of their life.

Residents are often surprised to hear such a significant proportion of our budget is taken up in this area, but social care covers a huge range of services, looking after adults, children and young people.

Our adult services teams offer crucial support and resources for people's wellbeing and independence - as we've highlighted in recent editions of One Darlington. Meanwhile, children's services safeguards the welfare and development of the youngest members of society. Both departments play a vital role in nurturing thriving, inclusive and resilient communities.

Here we provide a snapshot of some of the pressures faced across adults and children's services...



Significant and sustained increased demand, particularly since the pandemic, is putting unprecedented pressure on children's services – which is projected to overspend by £4.5m in the coming year, despite a 13% increase in budget.



The number of referrals into children's services has increased by **71%** since 2019 – with **902** referrals in 2022-23, compared to **529** in 2019-20.



The number of children in care has also increased. At the end of September, there were **359** looked after children in Darlington, compared to **270** in 2019-20.





The council's children's services was rated as **Good** by Ofsted at its most recent inspection last year. Inspectors noted staff's wide range of experience and skills.



The cost of looking after a vulnerable child or young person, who has significant and complex needs, can run into thousands of pounds per week.



Adult services is also under pressure, with Darlington having an increasingly elderly population. The England average of those over 65 is **18.4%**, in Darlington this is above average at **20.5%**.

The number of people moving into permanent care rose by **22%** in the past year – **163**, compared to **134** the previous year.



More people are being discharged from hospital into our care, with a **35%** increase in the past year – **1,060** this year compared to **785** the previous year.



Together, adults and children's services accounts for more than **two thirds** of our annual spending. Children's services' share of the council's overall budget has risen from **12%** in 2009-10 to **27%** in 2023-24.



The overall cost of residential care contracts has gone up by **15%** in the past year as providers wrestle with cost of living pressures and inflation.

Despite the pressures, our teams continue to work tirelessly across a range of different disciplines to provide vital services to our communities.



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There are over 6,000 children in care across the North East but just over 1,500 approved foster carers available (33% fewer than a year ago). This means there is an urgent need to recruit new carers.

The best gift you can give a child or young person is your time. Do you have time to support children and young people in need of help?

To help recruit more foster carers, we are working with 11 other local authorities on Foster with North East. This new and first-of-its-kind collaborative partnership has formed a hub, which will support prospective foster carers in the region through their full journey, from initial inquiry to application and beyond. The hub is the first point of contact if you are interested in fostering and will help you make an informed choice about how fostering could work for you.

Backed by the Department for Education, the hub offers a warm welcome, directs inquiries, and provides support throughout the application process. We need to recruit carers from a range of different backgrounds and circumstances. You don't need to be married, in full-time work, or own your own home to become a foster carer. Whether you choose to welcome a child or young person for a few hours, a night, a week, a month, a year or more, your home could be the right place, at the right time, for a child or young person who is unable to live at home.

We have 49 amazing foster carers, who receive an allowance designed to cover all aspects of the cost of caring for a child, as well as a professional fee per child in their care, which depends on the level of their experience.

In addition to the financial support, they also receive ongoing training, development and support to to give them the confidence to make a difference.

Can you be the reason siblings can stay together, a child smiles, or a young person grows in confidence? All children deserve the best care to support them to grow and develop into the best version of themselves.

Please share these tips with friends and family to stay safe this winter:

- Stay away from the edges of rivers and ponds, they may be slippy.
- Never walk onto ice covered ponds or rivers you don't know if the ice will support you
- If someone falls in, don't go in after them half of all ice-related drownings involve the attempted rescue of another person or pet
- If someone falls in, ring 999 immediately. Try to reach them from the bank using something like a piece of clothing, a pole or a long branch
- Keep dogs on leads when you're near water and don't throw sticks or toys into water for them to chase.

It's getting chilly and if you have a log burner or stove in your home, no doubt you will be enjoying its warm cosy glow.

Whilst log burners can seem to be the answer to tackling high fuel prices and creating a nice atmosphere, you need to be aware of what you're putting into your burner or stove. You could be burning the wrong type of fuel - causing air pollution and possible health problems for you, your family and your neighbours.

Burning wood can contribute to the release of harmful particulates which impact health. These not only affect outdoor air quality but also contribute to poorer air quality inside.

If you live in a smoke control area (which covers most of the town) you could be breaking the law by burning the wrong type of fuel in your log burner or stove. You can check if your home is in a smoke control area on our website.

If you're thinking about installing a log burner or multifuel stove, please give it careful consideration as there could be a cleaner, safer alternative. Learn before you burn!

MYTH:

Wood is an authorised smokeless fuel.

FACT: Wood is not an authorised smokeless fuel and isn't suitable for use in a smoke control area unless in an appropriate exempt appliance such as those listed on Defra's website.

MYTH:

I can burn any fuel, as long as I am using an exempt appliance.

FACT: Even if you have an exempt appliance, you must only burn permitted fuel for that specific appliance. Information can be found on the Defra website or in the manufacturer's handbook.

MYTH:

I can put any wood on my appliance including from a recently cut down tree.

FACT: Wood must be clean (no surface coatings such as varnish or paints) and seasoned/dry (moisture content of 20% or less). Look out for the Ready to Burn logo when buying wood fuel, and ensure it is kept dry until it is used.

New centre brings high quality employment opportunities

A new centre to manufacture cutting-edge vaccines and therapeutics has opened in Darlington. The £26.4 million RNA Centre of Excellence, will form a UK hub with the capability to develop and manufacture treatments for incurable or hard-to-treat illnesses.

The centre, which is part of CPI, has the capacity to deliver 100 million vaccine doses in the event of a health emergency. It will also supply material for clinical trials, working with companies on treatments against infectious and non-infectious diseases.

CPI employs over 100 people at its Darlington sites in 65 different roles including scientific, operations, administration and management positions.

The centre also hosts the RNA Training Academy which develops and shares expertise in this field.

George Hurley (right), a downstream scientist from

Darlington, said: "In my role I work on a lot of purification projects running processes to remove contaminants or impurities from the therapies we develop. This involves ensuring the components which make up a particular vaccine or therapy have not become contaminated with unwanted material.



"I wanted to be a scientist because I wanted to make a difference. Having studied for a masters degree at Newcastle University, I chose to work at CPI because of the range of development opportunities available, especially for someone in the early stages of their career. There is a variety of work and every day is different - I love a good challenge and I've gained lots of experience. I work with some fantastic people and I have a supportive line manager.

"I'm also co-chair of CPI's LGBTQ+ affinity group which gives people a safe space to discuss their experiences at work and helps CPI to develop an inclusive culture where people are able to bring their authentic self to work each day, which is really important.

"In terms of jobs local to the area, there's nothing really like CPI – there's a lot of jobs within the scientific industry which wouldn't be here if it wasn't for CPI, allowing people like me to continue living and working in the area."

Eastbourne work Completed Borough Council Completed Completed

Work has been completed on a major redevelopment of Eastbourne Sports Complex.

The project includes a new all-weather pitch, including changing facilities, turnstiles and access for up to 200 spectators.

The arena will be able to host matches up to Step 5 on the National League pyramid and will welcome hundreds of participants a week, from local community groups, grassroots and group bookings. The resurfacing of the main running track is complete, along with work to create a new athletics reception area.

Eastbourne Sports Complex, on behalf of the council, worked with the Football Foundation and the County Durham FA to secure a £941,842 grant towards the work.

An official opening event is due to take place this month.

On the roads again

As we head into winter, our staff are gearing up to get our fleet of seven gritters out on the roads again. Available day and night until the end of April, our gritting crews will be working hard to keep the town's roads safe and traffic moving.

Roly Ward, an LGV driver who has worked as part of the team of 18 drivers at the gritting service for 14 years, said: "Each winter, myself and colleagues from the Street Scene and highways services, take on additional duties to keep Darlington's roads ice-free.

"On top of our normal jobs, drivers pick up shifts to maintain six priority routes covering over 50% of Darlington's road network. This includes the main roads into and through the town, as well as all scheduled bus routes.

"During bad weather we receive several daily weather forecasts to inform us of the condition of the roads and we use this information to decide whether to grit or not. We don't have fixed gritting times. We grit roads whenever it is necessary - working through the night, on weekends and holidays.

"There can be up to three shifts each day and in the worst conditions the whole crew is needed to staff the service. For me there is no such thing as a typical week. I am on call to cover the full day on a Saturday and I am back-up for the main force of drivers through the week. How often I'm on the roads really is dependent on the changing weather - if we get a particularly cold snap things can become pretty hectic!

"Although working the additional hours keeps us busy, the sense of camaraderie among us drivers is great. It is really rewarding knowing that the work we're doing is making people's lives a little easier and is helping to keep them safe.

"This winter it's worth keeping an eye out for where our gritters will be, to give you peace of mind before setting off in your car. We will post regular updates on our web page to let you know when we're out and about. If you see us, do give us a wave and remember salt needs to be worked into the road by traffic for it to work.

"There are some simple things you can also do to keep safe on the roads this winter including leaving plenty of time for your journey, clearing your windows and roof of snow and ice and making sure your car and tyres are well maintained and in good working order."

Bin wagons 'go veggie'



than 90%.

As part of our ambition to become carbon neutral by 2040, we're trialling a new biofuel in half of our household waste wagon fleet. Six vehicles are being powered by hydrotreated vegetable oil (HVO) to see if it will be a viable alternative to diesel.

HVO is a fossil-free alternative to mineral diesel and can be interchanged with diesel very easily with no modifications needed, making the trial process quick and easy. Our bin wagon fleet accounts for 1,200 tonnes of carbon emissions each year so reducing this by around 90% would be a huge step for us towards our 2040 target.

with electric vehicles and we have 17 vehicles

to date. However, electric bin wagons are very expensive and so alternatives are being explored.

The HVO trial will explore any potential issues, including the cost, to see if these are outweighed by the environmental benefits.

This work will contribute to our pledge to become carbon neutral by 2040. This pledge covers all service areas, and we want to encourage residents and businesses to join us on the journey towards a greener and more sustainable future. More details are available at www.darlington.gov.uk/sustainable

Worried about someone you've seen begging or sleeping rough?

Here's what happens when you report it!

People you see begging on the street may not be homeless, but whatever their circumstances, everyone matters and we want to offer them support.

We need you to tell us about people who appear homeless or are begging. There are several ways you can do this (see details below) please provide the location and as much information as you can.

When you raise an alert, it goes to our housing options team and our outreach service, provided by the 700 Club, and an outreach worker goes out to the location to try to find the person. The worker talks to them to find out why they are begging or sleeping rough and offers support that could include finding accommodation, contacting a landlord, budgeting, finance and claiming benefits, accessing health, alcohol and substance misuse services, and direction to food banks.

The offer of help is not always accepted at first, but we will continue to make contact and keep offering support.

If the person is not there, we will try and leave contact details for them to access support.

During the past year, 21 alerts were raised via StreetLink.

Seven were for the same person, who has been contacted more than 50 times, but despite ongoing efforts still declines any support.

Five could not be located.

Nine were offered support – including four from out of town who were supported to return to their own local authority.

You also told us about nine individuals who were begging – 276 contacts were made with them, an average of 30 per person, to offer support.

Any home can suffer from condensation and mould. If you've got condensation, there's a good chance it won't be long before you're battling mould.

Condensation can be caused by warm air hitting cold surfaces or by lots of humidity in the air. The air cools and droplets form, creating a damp environment and a perfect breeding ground for mould.

A dry home with lots of fresh air is the best weapon against mould. Landlords and tenants both have roles to play in preventing and tackling mould.

A landlord should:

- · ensure the property is well-ventilated
- check the heating is working well
- insulate the property
- look for signs of mould during regular inspections and ensure extractor fans are working
- promptly repair issues such as leaky plumbing and guttering, missing roof tiles and damage to the damp-proof course
- regularly clear out gutters and drains
- act quickly if mould appears remove it and apply anti-mould paint
- discuss the issue with tenants to raise awareness.

Tenants can help by:

- avoiding hanging clothes to dry indoors with the windows closed
- placing salt boxes in rooms where moisture occurs such as bathrooms, kitchens, bedrooms and wardrobes
- leaving a gap between furniture and walls of at least 10cm so air can circulate
- opening windows regularly
- using the extractor fan, if you have one, when cooking and showering
- wiping down wet surfaces such as shower screens
- closing the kitchen door when cooking to stop moist air moving to other parts of the property
- reporting signs of mould and any necessary repairs to the landlord or letting agent.
