As we look ahead to 2024, our focus remains unwavering. Our vision is to ensure Darlington remains a vibrant and thriving place to live, with opportunities for all.




I have witnessed firsthand the strength that arises when a community comes together. Meeting challenges demands a holistic approach. Through open communication and shared responsibility, we

Last year 186 young people living in care left their supportive care homes to take their next step of independence by setting up a home of their own.

Our children's services care team continues to support care leavers when they leave their foster care homes for as long as they feel they need it.

An awards evening was recently held to celebrate care leavers and showcase their strengths and achievements.

Robin Stein was in care from 15 years of age and now works as a children's residential support worker.

Billy Lawson, who experienced foster care from 11, is now 31, and loving his post at Darlington Memorial Hospital as a security guard. He also volunteers at Pepperfield Farm Hedgehog Rescue and champions men's mental health.

Changes introduced by the Elections Act 2022 will be fully in force ahead of elections to be held later this year.

As with last year's elections, all voters will be required to take photographic identification (ID) with them when voting at polling stations. A list of the acceptable forms of photographic ID is available on our website and will also appear on your poll card. If you do not have one of the photographic ID listed, you will be able to apply for a voter authority certificate.

Further changes will be introduced ahead of the police and crime commissioner and the Tees Valley Combined Authority mayoral elections, which take place on Thursday 2 May.

A (parliamentary) general election will also be held by January 2025, and may take place this year.

A number of changes to voting by post, and proxy voting (where you need someone else to vote for you) have been introduced.



These include:

- a new requirement to check and verify a person's identity when an application for a postal or proxy vote is made
- the introduction of a new online system for both postal and some proxy vote applications www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote
- a restriction on the number of electors for whom one person can act as a proxy (reduced to four)
- electors will be required to re-apply for their postal vote every three years.

Postal voting

If you wish to apply for a postal vote for the police and crime commissioner and the Tees Valley Combined Authority mayoral elections in May, applications must be received by 5pm on Tuesday 17 April.

Applications can be made via the government's new online system, or by using the application form on the next page. We will need to verify a person's identity for all new applications.

If you already have a Postal Vote set up there is no need to reapply until we contact you.

The council's budget for the next financial year, and our four-year medium-term financial plan (MTFP), are now out for public consultation.

Don't miss out on the chance to have your say!

Like many councils across the country, we are facing significant financial challenges stemming from reductions in public spending between 2010 and 2019, when our budget was reduced by £46m in real terms – a 36% reduction.

The difficult financial position has worsened in the aftermath of the pandemic and the current economic climate, with demand for services rising and the cost of delivering services increasing because of high inflation and interest rates.

Over two thirds of our budget is spent on adult and children's social care, caring for our most vulnerable residents and children, and these costs are rising.

Since the pandemic there has been a 33% increase in children in our care, many with increasingly complex needs requiring help and support. Rising inflation means the cost of our adult care contracts increased by 15.6% over the last year. These are our largest budgets yet only touch 4% of our population.

To protect services as far as possible, council budgets have been reviewed and challenged and savings of £4m achieved through savings and efficiencies, which do not affect front line service delivery.

In addition, a council tax increase of 2.99% and a 2% social care precept to help fund adult social care has been proposed which would generate £1.869m and £1.250m respectively to help continue to provide vital services.

To help our most vulnerable households, we have agreed to extend our council tax reduction scheme in its existing form for another year. This scheme offers a council tax discount to eligible residents on low incomes whether in work, unemployed or retired.

Darlington is not alone in facing these pressures. Councils across the country are struggling with the



same issues which have been widely reported in the media with a growing number indicating the inability to balance their books.

Without extra government funding, we will need to carry out a fundamental review during 2024, to decide what services will be delivered in the coming years and how.

Extensive consultations will be carried out with residents, staff, charities, businesses and other key stakeholders, to explore how we can deal with the scale of the financial challenge we face.

Ofsted has once again praised the council's children's services teams.

Inspectors paid a focused visit late last year – following an earlier visit in October 2022, in which the service was given an overall rating of good, with outstanding elements.

The return visit, rather than being a full inspection, focused on the council's arrangements for children in need and children subject to a protection plan, provided by children's services.

Inspectors looked at a range of evidence, including case discussions with social workers, performance management, quality assurance information, and children's case records.

Ofsted was impressed with comprehensive performance information, and quality assurance activity, helping leaders to understand child experience and progress, and noted that this leads to robust child-centred responses to identified risk and need.

Cllr Nick Wallis, cabinet member for children and young people, said: "We are delighted children's services have been praised once again for their great work by the Ofsted inspection team and welcome their positive feedback.

"The report recognises the quality of the services we provide and concurs we ensure a relentless

focus on continuing to improve the experiences of children who need help and protection in Darlington, ensuring the children and their families are at the heart of our work.

"We work extremely well with partners and agencies, sharing information to ensure we work safely and closely together and support families to take responsibility for decision making, when appropriate.

"I meet regularly with staff and some of the young people who use our children's services and am consistently impressed by the respect, trust, and great working relationships that are formed.

"This Ofsted inspection report reflects the hard work carried out by our diverse teams of children's services staff, and I would like to thank them all for their commitment, passion, and dedication. They really do make a difference to people's lives.

"We recognise there is always room for improvement, this focused report witnesses our continued drive to improve where improvements can be made.

"We are committed to continuing to deliver the very best services possible for all our children and young people to ensure they have the best possible experiences growing up in Darlington."



Town twinning association anniversary

Towns throughout Europe decided to take part in twinning as a way to bring people together, by establishing exchanges and celebrating that our similarities are much greater than our differences.

The anniversary celebrations included a visit by 32 citizens from Mülheim in July. During their stay they met the Mayor Jan Cossins, had a guided tour of the town, a great evening at the Quoits Club, and days out in Northumberland and the Durham Dales. A civic party and association members also visited Mülheim.

In early December, in conjunction with the Mülheim Twinning Association, a Christmas market stall was opened in their old town, where jam, chutney, ginger wine, Yorkshire tea and other items were on sale.

What does 'biodiversity net gain' mean? PARLINGTON BOILD ROUNG COUNCIL SOUTH PARK LAKE

Biodiversity net gain is an environmental hot topic, especially when it comes to development. But to many people this might be the first time they have heard of it. So, what is biodiversity net gain? Put simply, biodiversity is the variety of life found in an area – including animals, plants, fungi and even micro-organisms; and net gain is an overall increase. Therefore, biodiversity net gain simply means the increase in biodiversity in an area.

Why does this matter?

Biodiversity net gain is important as it allows the development and management of land to have a positive impact on nature and leave the natural environment in a better state than it was before. It does this by enhancing, creating and increasing habitats on a site, which will hopefully increase the wildlife in the area.

If habitats cannot be created on a development site, then they can be created elsewhere within the local area. However, if this is not possible, the government has a system which allows developers to buy credits which create habitats at a different location. The credits can only be bought once all other options for habitat creation onsite and offsite have been exhausted. In Darlington we have been working towards securing areas which can be used as offsite habitat creation which will increase biodiversity within the borough. These areas will be managed and monitored for a 30-year period.

The background

Darlington's Local Plan (2016 – 2036) already has a requirement for developments to show a biodiversity net gain. However, as of this month, there is a legal requirement for at least a 10% increase in biodiversity for large sites, and then from April 2024 this will also cover small sites. This means that developers must increase biodiversity levels to a minimum of 10% to secure planning permission, as without it, planning permission will be declined. Habitats will then need to be protected, managed, and monitored for a period of 30 years.



"I am Lauren Gibson, the council's ecologist and have been in post since the end of July last year. I came directly from working within private ecological consultancies where I was a senior ecologist.

"Before working in ecology, I was a lecturer at a large land-based college for 11 years, specialising in ecology and conservation, and biodiversity restoration.

"As a lecturer, I was involved in organising environmental and ecological field trips and took groups of students across the globe to places such as the Netherlands, Belgium, South Africa, and Transylvania.

"I have also volunteered at Knepp Rewilding in West Sussex, teaching budding ecologists about bird ringing, survey techniques for habitats and wildlife, and undertaking biodiversity net gain assessments.

"I am extremely enthusiastic about the natural world, especially native wildlife. I have a

passion for birds, reptiles and amphibians, bats, hedgehogs, and beavers! In my spare time I volunteer as a bird ringer for the British Trust for Ornithology, generating valuable data on survival, productivity, and movements and migration of birds.

"I am also a registered bat carer for the Bat Conservation Trust and a trustee of Durham Bat Group.

"As the council ecologist, I have a wide range of job roles, such as providing advice and recommendations on ecological matters including planning applications; working with Tees Valley Combined Authority in the development of the Local Nature Recovery Strategy; and working collaboratively to get the best outcomes for nature within the borough.

"I have a vision for Darlington that we will increase green space for nature and for people, and our natural habitats will become bigger, better and more joined up."

Can you step up to help a pup?

Hearing Dogs for Deaf People has expanded its work into Darlington and needs more help. Michael Douglas, area training manager, said: "We need full time and short-term volunteers who can help us raise and train our dogs. From eight weeks to around 16 months old, our hearing dog pups stay with one of our volunteer puppy trainers where they will receive most of their obedience training and attend regular sessions at one of our training centres. As well as pups, we also need volunteers to look after older dogs at different stages in their training.

"A big part of a hearing dog's job is to alert their deaf partner to sounds they would otherwise miss such as a smoke alarm, alarm clock, and even a baby's cry. Imagine you are deaf. You can't hear your alarm clock. You can't hear your text message alerts. You miss out on social interactions. That's what life is like for deaf people, and it can be very isolating.

"Volunteers are asked to provide: a loving home and secure garden; access to IT for video calling and online training; lots of time to give a young pup or dog - we cannot accept people who work full time even from home; access to a vehicle for

training and emergency purposes; aged 18 or over and live in the catchment area.

No previous experience is required – you will have full support and guidance from a local, qualified, trainer."

Fixing roads around Our town DARLINGTON Borough Council

Our highways service employs over 60 people to maintain and improve the town's roads, footpaths, bridges, street lights and traffic signals. Looking after our 366 miles of carriageways is a central part of the service and by the end of the financial year in March, we will have spent about £2.9million on essential repairs to our roads.

Sara Forbes, principal engineer, has worked for the highways service in Darlington for five years. Here's what she had to say about the service.

"Looking after highways is like painting the Forth Bridge – as soon as you finish, you start again! Keeping our road networks in good working order is important for the local economy, the environment and quality of life for residents.

"All of the town's major routes, including those leading out of Darlington or connecting different areas, are maintained by the team; we also look after smaller roads connecting residential areas. Each year our roads are surveyed, and we use this information to decide where and when works are needed. This feeds into our yearly work schedule and five-year plan, which sets out how our budget will be spent. We also carry out regular safety inspections of the network throughout the year and repair any defects

"Each year around 7,000 permit requests are received from utility companies. These are considered when coordinating works to minimise disruption. Most work tends to happen during the spring and summer. This is because the conditions are better for resurfacing roads. Work on major routes is scheduled during the summer holidays and overnight where possible as traffic is lighter.

"We do our best to keep people informed about road works. Where there are planned closures, we issue letters to residents and businesses in the affected area, update the council website and display advanced notice signs on the affected road. When there is high impact work planned, we'll also keep the local media informed and share news on social media.

"In the past, roads were replaced once they had reached the end of their life. Now we focus on preventing problems and treating roads earlier. This means that some damaged roads will not be fixed as quickly in the short term. However, in the long term it will ensure the longevity of roads, save money, and lessen disruption to your journeys."

Work to upgrade our CCTV system, to replace the last of its older analogue cameras, has now been completed helping to keep us all safe.

A total of 74 cameras have been replaced with new equipment offering improved images and better results. The work has also included a move to a wireless transmission network to stream images into the security control centre, which is staffed through the day and night, 365 days a year.

The £513,500 project has been supported by the police and crime commissioner's office, which pledged £25,000 a year for ten years, alongside revenue savings of £33,000 a year, which means the upgrade had no impact on the council's overall budget.

First introduced in the 1990s, the system has grown from a 37-camera network to more than 200 in strategic locations across the borough and the team works closely with police and civic enforcement officers to help reduce crime and antisocial behaviour.

Their combined efforts managed to identify and track a suspect as well as link two separate incidents, which resulted in the arrest of a dangerous man in connection with offences of sexual assault and trespass with intent to commit a sexual offence in the town in June last year. He was later sentenced at Teesside Crown Court to 14 years imprisonment and two additional years on extended licence.

Also recognised were members of our trading standards team who worked closely with police to develop Operation Nightstar. This is a proactive intelligence gathering and evidence-led initiative targeted people selling illegal vapes and tobacco who were suspected of being connected to the exploitation of children and vulnerable people.

Meet the quality team

The quality and practice team works to promote and monitor quality within the council's adults and children's services, embedding quality assurance and improvement frameworks throughout both areas.

We work closely with families and carers to capture feedback by engaging with those who use our services to collect valuable quality assurance and improvement information.

We believe that quality is everybody's business and that people should be at the heart of all that we do with regards to professional practice.

What else does the team do?

We support many areas of work, including preparing for the Care Quality Commission assessment of adult social care with inspections beginning in 2024, and preparation for Ofsted inspections of children's services, which began in November 2017 against the current inspection framework.





We also have a realistic aircraft room, fitted with internal parts from a Boeing 737, including original seating and a functioning galley. Bringing the sights and sounds of aircraft travel to life, SimFly is as close to reality as you can get.

"We are a unique business in the North East and as a local lad, I'm proud to be able to host my business here. There's been loads of investment in recent years and Darlington is definitely a town on the up, offering exciting opportunities for local entrepreneurs.

"Since we launched in 2021 we have had over 1,000 customers and have seen the number of visitors increase year on year. This includes private and regularly visiting clients as well as local schools, colleges and universities whose students are all hopeful for a career in the aviation sector.

NEVER PUT BATTERIES IN ANY OF YOUR BINS





40,000 tonnes of batteries are bought in the UK every year but less than half are recycled properly.



In 2022, a Street Scene team was forced to tip waste onto a road in Firthmoor after a blaze in the back of the wagon caused by an electric drill battery.



Many batteries are built into devices such as scooters, phones and vapes and they all need safely disposing of.



Many shops have battery recycling collection points or you can take them to the tip on Whessoe Road.



Lithium ion batteries are widely used as they are light and contain more energy, but this makes them more dangerous. Fires caused by lithium ion batteries are self sustaining and very hard to put out.



If you are taking batteries to the tip please make sure they go in the right container, please ask a member of staff if you are unsure.



If batteries are thrown away with general rubbish they are crushed in the bin wagon which causes highly flammable chemicals to leak out and fires can start either in the wagon or at the treatment plant.

One serious fire a day is caused in the UK because of batteries.

Disposable vapes should be put in the small mixed WEEE container.

Laptops, mobile phones and other electrical equipment with fixed batteries (such as drills, screwdrivers and other DIY equipment) should be put into the small mixed WEEE container as a whole unit.

There is a dedicated container for lead, acid and gel batteries.

Teesside Airport Staff Walking on Air After Scooping Double Awards Win

Passengers have voted
Teesside International Airport
as the Best UK Airport for
Leisure Travel at the country's
biggest travel awards.

The airport picked up the gong at the British Travel Awards – the largest survey of consumer opinion on everything to do with leisure travel. The awards cover the whole holiday sector, with travel companies, cruise lines, travel agents, hotel brands, airlines and airports all in the running.

The transformation of Teesside Airport, including its renovation, new routes, and punctuality – plus becoming the first airport in the UK to scrap the 100ml liquid limit in security – have made a huge impression on passengers, who voted in their thousands to make Teesside top of the list.

This is the latest award success, after scooping UK & Irish Airport of the Year at the TTG Travel Industry Awards. The airport also netted a Highly Commended honour when up against global competition in the International Airport Review's Airport Experience Award, and another Highly Commended

at the Airport Operators Association UK Airports Health & Safety Week.

This has rounded off another successful year for Teesside, which has welcomed the most passengers for 11 years in just the first nine months of 2023. Tickets for 2024's summer season – including Alicante, Bulgaria, Corfu, Dalaman and Majorca are on sale now, with Faro set to go on sale soon.

The first unit – Unit D – at the airport's £200million Business Park South has now been built, along with the 1.5km link road. A further 27,000sq ft hangar is under development to boost capacity

for aircraft maintenance and storage to attract more businesses to the site.

And the airport's Aviation Academy recently threw open its doors to aviation students from Teesside University, so they can put the knowledge and skills they are learning in the classroom into practice at an operational airport.

Whether it's leisure, business or for the future of local people, the multi-award-winning Teesside Airport will be flying high for 2024.





Business boost for climate change

Businesses across Darlington are working together to help tackle climate change and we want more people to get involved.

Last year saw the creation of the Darlington Employers Environment Partnership (DEEP), the brainchild of Darlington Building Society (DBS). Wendy Dyson and her husband David are among our latest tenants to enjoy a warmer, more energy efficient home, thanks to a programme of upgrades supported by government funding.

The council was awarded over £275,000 from the Social Housing Decarbonisation Fund which was matched with around £317,000 from our housing revenue account to upgrade some of our housing stock with a range of energy efficiency measures including external or cavity wall insulation, double glazing, composite doors and solar panels.

In all 23 homes across the town have been upgraded to help keep tenants' energy bills down, and the Dysons couldn't be happier with the results at the home they've lived in for the past 26 years.

"We've had doubled glazed windows installed, as well as new front and back doors which we got to choose, solar panels and external wall insulation with a brick effect finish," explains Mrs Dyson.

"We've been really happy with the contractors and the work they've done, and we like how it all looks. The new windows mean we don't get condensation as much and we can already feel the difference, it's a lot warmer and we don't need to have the heating on for as long so

we don't pay for as much energy."

Other improvements carried out included new canopies, ventilation and upgrades to guttering and roofing with work completed on homes in Bates Avenue, Spring Court, Redworth Road and Berwick Road.

In July 2019, the council declared a climate emergency and we are committed to becoming carbon neutral by 2040. Schemes like this help us work towards the government's energy efficiency and net zero carbon targets and provide our tenants with homes that are energy efficient, affordable, comfortable, and safe. Music helps give youngsters in care the best start

Babies and children under five who are in care are set to benefit from free music-making resources to help give them the best start.

The free bags of music-making equipment will be given to youngsters across the borough. The bags contain instruments, finger puppets and recordings of nursery rhymes and songs to help carers and children sing and make music together.

The bags are part of a larger project, This is the Place, funded by Youth Music, Creative Darlington, County Durham Community Foundation and the council. The project includes musical workshops for children and their carers, and events at cultural venues giving them the chance to experience the town's cultural offer, perhaps for the first time.

It is delivered by North East charity Blue Cabin in partnership with staff from the council's fostering and supported lodgings team, while Theatre Hullaballoo hosts events and performances for babies, children and their carers. Jenny Young, director of Blue Cabin, said: "Research has shown that music can play a really important role in the first few years of a child's life, it can help with communication between adults and children, and it can help even very young babies form a bond with their carers.

"We're delighted to have been able to work with the council to help care-experienced children and babies, and their carers discover these benefits, and the latest step in this is providing these resources for babies and children to use at home."
