Have your say in May!



On Thursday 2 May, voters in Darlington will elect a Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) for the Durham police area and a mayor for the Tees Valley Combined Authority (TVCA).

Voter ID

You are now required to show photographic identification (ID) when voting at a polling station. Accepted forms of ID include a UK passport, UK driving licence, older person's bus pass and disabled person's bus pass - it must be the original not a photocopy. You now need photo ID to vote at a polling station

A full list of the acceptable forms of ID can be found at www.electoralcommission.org.uk and will also be listed on your poll card. Expired documents can be accepted as long as the photograph remains a true likeness of you.

If you don't have an accepted form of ID or you're not sure whether you still look like the photo on your ID, you can apply for a voter authority certificate either online, by post or in person. You must be registered to vote before you apply for a voter authority certificate. An application form is available from our elections office, or you can apply online at www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-idvoter-authority-certificate

Registration, postal votes and proxy votes

You must be registered if you wish to vote in the elections. If you are not already registered you have until Tuesday 16 April to do so. You can do it online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote, call the elections office on 406444 or email elections@darlington.gov.uk

You can also vote by post or appoint someone else to vote on your behalf (by proxy). The deadline for postal vote applications is 5pm on Wednesday 17 April, and for a proxy to vote it is 5pm on Wednesday 24 April. You can apply online at www.gov.uk/applypostal-vote or you can use the application form on the next page or contact the elections office.

If you miss the post, you can hand in your postal vote and/or postal votes for up to five others at the Town Hall or at any polling station in the constituency before 10pm on Thursday 2 May. When handing in postal votes you will need to complete a form before they can be accepted.

The PCC oversees the running of local police services and holds the chief constable to account on behalf of residents.

The role involves ensuring an efficient and effective police service within the area; setting the force budget and determining the precept; setting police and crime objectives and publishing a police and crime plan that reflects those objectives.



The Mayor of the TVCA chairs a cabinet made up of the leaders (in the case of Middlesbrough Council the elected mayor) of the five Tees Valley councils - Darlington, Hartlepool, Middlesbrough, Redcar and Cleveland and Stockton-on-Tees.

The TVCA has responsibility for economic growth, transport, infrastructure, skills, business investment, housing, culture and tourism.

All residents who can vote at the TVCA mayoral election will receive a booklet about the role of the mayor before the election.





Budget plans approved



The council's budget for the next financial year and our four-year medium-term financial plan were agreed last month.

Like many councils across the country, we are in a difficult financial position stemming from public spending cuts between 2010 and 2019, along with significant demand and inflation pressures.

The amount of Council Tax you will pay in 2024/25 was agreed by full council as part of the budget discussions.


Your Council Tax contributes towards a net investment of £128m in day to day services provided by the council.

The free event, which coincided with National Apprenticeship Week, boasted nearly 100 exhibitors including employers from both public sector organisations and private businesses.

Renowned science exhibition STEMFest comes to town

Scientific industries are a significant and growing part of our local economy, offering high quality, well paid and exciting career opportunities for people living in and around Darlington.

This month, children from across the Tees Valley, and over 20 local schools, are being welcomed to Mowden Park Rugby Club to visit the renowned STEMFest exhibition, which seeks to inspire and encourage young people to pursue careers in industries including science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM).

Hosted by the North East STEM Hub and delivered by RTC North, in partnership with the council, the annual festival gives attendees the chance to take part in a series of fun-filled, hands on activities relating to different STEM careers, while helping them to make real world connections between what they are learning in the classroom and the work environment.

Over 40 local STEM businesses will be supporting the two-day event, which is sponsored by Cummins, giving children the opportunity to meet real people doing real jobs, while highlighting the wide range of opportunities which are open to them and are a realistic prospect for their future.

Claire Willis, team leader for the North East STEM HUB, said: "I am delighted that STEMFest is coming to Darlington. There are so many north east companies working in STEM sectors which our future workforce isn't aware of. Through this event, we aim to enthuse and engage young people in STEM, highlighting not only the companies, but also the various career paths open to these young people, right on their doorstep."

Ground-breaking weight loss surgery

Patients in County Durham and Darlington are amongst the first in the country to benefit from a pioneering new procedure aimed at reducing weight and helping people with obesity.

The procedure especially helps those who would benefit significantly from weight loss surgery but for whom the traditional surgical approach is too high risk due to pre-existing health conditions.

Professor Anjan Dhar, Consultant Gastroenterologist & Endoscopist explains: "Endoscopic sutured gastroplasty (ESG) is performed under general anaesthetic, using an endoscope (a small camera inserted into the patient's stomach via their mouth). Attached to the camera is a tiny stitching device - a fine needle and permanent sutures. Using the camera to see what they are doing, the endoscopist stitches the stomach from the inside to shrink it to less than half of its normal capacity and reducing its food capacity. Whilst the normal stomach is usually able to expand following food, the procedure restricts expansion, meaning the patient will feel incredibly full after a small meal.

"Our specialists in bariatric, or weight loss, surgery, and endoscopy work as a team to perform this procedure – giving fresh hope to patients, which is enormously satisfying."

Consultant Bariatric Surgeon, Mr Akeil Samier, adds: "Some people who have become very overweight are keen to undergo surgery as their obesity is causing or adding to other serious health conditions like diabetes, heart disease or stroke. Unfortunately, those health conditions can also make surgery by traditional techniques which involve an incision, too risky. This new endoscopic procedure can be life changing.

"Over 25% of the adult population in England has a body mass index (BMI) which classifies them as obese. A further 37% are classed as being overweight – that's an incredible 62% of the population who are not a healthy weight. Being



overweight carries huge health risks including being more likely to develop type 2 diabetes, high blood pressure or cancer, heart problems or stroke and generally poorer health quality.

"Initially, we support people to develop a better diet but this doesn't work for everyone.

"There are various weight loss surgical options which are performed using either keyhole or the more traditional incision techniques. However, being overweight makes surgery more risky and potentially more complicated. For overweight patients with some other medical conditions, the risk can become too high."

Professor Dhar adds: "This new procedure doesn't involve an incision so is much less risky. It brings the patient's weight down gradually, from a BMI of around 40-45 to around 30, with a weight loss of around 12% in the first year. It's so transformational around 30% of people using diabetes medication are able to come off it. There's also evidence of a reduced risk of heart problems or stroke and of overall health improvement."

Get involved and make a difference to your community

If you want to make changes and improve where you live, joining a local residents' association can be a great start.

There are several in Darlington that are there for all who live in the local area - you don't have to be a council tenant.

Pop into your local community centre to find out how you can get involved. If you can't get out and about easily there are still ways that you can join in.

Lascelles Park Residents' Association is run by a small group of volunteers and at over 50 years old, is one of the oldest of its kind in Darlington. Many fantastic projects have been completed by the group.

After a pause during the pandemic, when several of their devoted volunteers retired after decades of service, residents of Lascelles were asked "do you still want a residents' group?" and the answer was a definite yes!

Kerami Roberts, a new volunteer, described what they do: "Our number one job is to make people's lives better. This may be through spreading good news or dealing with local issues. We often have guests at our meetings who work in our community.

For example, our police community support officer, housing officers and local councillors who will hear our concerns, deal with them, then report back.

"We also fundraise for local projects such as our playground, developing the gardens of care homes, providing things for our young people to do and making living here better. Funds are raised either through bids to the council, the National Lottery or local businesses, for example.

"Everything is done by volunteers who work on behalf of our residents. Anyone over 18 who lives in the area and attends a meeting can have a say on where and on what the funds are spent. You don't have to attend every meeting, just pop in and see what's going on or to voice your concerns, we will listen to you!

"We use Facebook and also leaflets delivered through doors to keep everyone updated on what we're doing. We meet at 6pm at Rosemary Court care home, Blackton Grove, on the second Wednesday of each month except December and August. Our next meetings are on 10 April and 8 May. There is a warm welcome to all. Tell us your concerns and ideas and be part of it!"

Whether it's a toaster that's not toasting, a kettle that's not boiling or a cherished family heirloom ornament that's broken in two, there's very little the repair team at Darlington Fixit Café won't try to mend.

The handy volunteers meet on the last Saturday of the month from 11am until 1pm at the hub, next to the Friends Meeting House on Skinnergate. The next dates for your diary are Saturday 30 March, 27 April and 25 May.

You can pop along with your broken item and one of the team will have a go at fixing it for you. Please don't take items that could easily be fixed elsewhere such as white goods or clothes. The cafe runs on a pay as you feel basis and there's tea, coffee, and cake on offer too!

Volunteer, Cat McConnachie, said: "The Fixit Cafe is run by people who like fixing things and want to share their knowledge, skills, and enthusiasm. Since we began, we've had all sorts through the door - a clockwork toy, inflatable dinosaur, laptop hinge, fairy lights, vacuum cleaner, electric flosser, wheelchair blanket and lots more.

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"People throw away vast amounts of stuff that could be repaired and given a new lease of life. Our team can make sure things are used for longer and not just thrown away. It saves money and reduces the amount of raw materials used to make new products. It cuts CO2 emissions, for example, because manufacturing new products and recycling old ones causes CO2 to be released."

Although not organised by the council, the cafe contributes to the council's pledge to become carbon neutral by 2040. Work has started inside the railway station as part of the £140m plans to redevelop the site.

The work includes the creation of two new platforms, a car park and footbridge as well as changes to the layout of the existing station.

As work progresses, hoardings have been erected along platform 1 and seating moved to accessible parts of the platform. From Wednesday 6 March, the thoroughfare between platforms 1 and 4 will be closed off while work continues. Access to platform 1 will be clearly signposted around the south end of the station buildings by platforms 2 and 3. If you are catching a train please allow extra time to get to the right platform.

At the end of March, a new temporary ticket retail facility will also open opposite the existing travel centre and will stay open until the work is completed.

For the fifth year in a row, Darlington has been flagged as a great place for a night out.

Nationally, the evening economy is worth over £66bn annually and is a major part of our local economy. Following a thorough reassessment process, conducted by the Association of Town and City Management, we have once again been awarded Purple Flag status.

The accreditation has only been awarded to 100 destinations globally and represents the gold standard of evening and night time leisure and entertainment.

The rigorous reaccreditation process involved written submissions, public feedback and an inspection by a team of experts who were impressed by the town's blend of entertainment, dining and culture, as well as the council's commitment to the safety of local residents and visitors. Services including Number 40, which offers a safe space for people who feel vulnerable or who are unwell on a night out, and the town's upgraded CCTV system and control room, received special mention from assessors.

Other factors considered as part of the reaccreditation process included evidence of strong partnership working, the range of leisure and entertainment options, the quality of customer care and the wellbeing of visitors including how easily people can move around the town and get home safely.

New national recycling rules are being introduced for businesses across the country.

The simpler recycling reforms, announced last year, mean all businesses with more than ten employees, must have separate food waste and recycling collections in place by the end of March 2025. The same rules apply for organisations such as hospitals and schools

The reforms, which will establish standard recycling rules across the country for businesses and, eventually, for households, mean businesses must have a separate food bin, refuse bin and recycling bin.


Businesses with ten or more employees must implement these changes from 31 March 2025 whilst those with fewer than ten full-time employees have until 31 March 2027.

Under the new scheme, recyclable materials which must be separated from general waste, include:

- Glass such as drinks bottles and rinsed empty food jars
- Metal such as drinks cans and food tins
- Plastic such as rinsed empty food containers and bottles
- Paper such as old newspapers and envelopes
- Cardboard such as delivery boxes and packaging
- Food waste including tea bags, coffee grounds, leftovers or waste generated by food preparation (there is no minimum amount for food waste).

We will be in touch with all businesses who we collect trade waste from with details of how the scheme will work and as the deadline approaches we will update our website at www.darlington.gov.uk/businesswaste with everything you need to know.

All waste carriers will be following these new rules so if you use another company to collect your rubbish please contact them for details of how they will be implementing the new scheme.

Urban Deli opened at Darlington Market in Autumn 2023 and is already proving to be a fantastic success. The specialist retailer is the third outlet at the market operated by Ory Vanes, and focusses on quality and local food, with the vast majority of items being sourced from within 50 miles of Darlington. Tasty treats on offer include local dairy produce, baked goods, artisan ingredients and a range of pickles and preserves.

Meanwhile acclaimed chef, Matei Baran, who appeared on BBC's MasterChef, is set to open a continental style deli selling produce including cheeses, meats and meze dishes. Matie explains: "Being a chef isn't just a job for me; it's a lifelong love affair with food. The MAM team shares the same passion as I do for good food and its ability to bring communities together. I can see the vision for what Darlington Market is becoming and it's very exciting to be a part of that."

What is Enhanced Access?

Did you know that since 1 October 2022, Darlington Primary Care Network (PCN) has offered access to appointments on weekdays and evenings, 7.30am-9pm (Mon-Thur), 6:30am-8:30pm (Fri), and weekends and bank holidays, 8am-8pm. This is part of NHS England's Enhanced Access offer whereby appointments are offered outside of practice hours at a registered Darlington Primary Care Practice; these appointments may not be your usual practice and could be with our subcontracted partner, Primary Healthcare Darlington, based on Woodlands Road.

Please note that Enhanced Access appointments are **NOT** emergency appointments; they must be booked in advance and are intended for those who cannot access their practice during usual practice hours. You can book an Enhanced Access appointment by speaking with a receptionist at your local practice. Depending on the nature of your issue, you will be referred to the most appropriate healthcare professional within Darlington PCN, which includes doctors, nurses, and healthcare assistants.

What is the Darlington Primary Care Network (PCN)?

New Enhanced Access Appointments Available in Darlington

Based on local data/evidence, Darlington PCN has introduced 3 new services to its Enhanced Access offer, which are delivered by Darlington Primary Healthcare (Woodlands Road) and include:

- Women's Health Clinic: Saturday 1-5pm (offers specialist advice from female GPs on areas such as menopause, HRT, post-menopausal bleeding, coil fits for HRT or bleeding issues (not contraception), and ring pessary fits for patients who require a change of their device.
- Ear Micro-Suction: Bi-weekly Sunday 9am-12.30pm (offered to patients where ear syringing is not appropriate. Appointments can be arranged via registered GP practice, please note, that a telephone consultation is required by a nurse prior to this procedure).

Eating healthy starts early!

Early years professionals, such as childminders and childcare providers, are being encouraged to apply for the Healthy Early Years (HEY) catering award. The aim is for anyone working with children and families to ensure the healthy choice is the 'normal' choice.

It is important that food offered in early years settings provides appropriate amounts of energy and nutrients and encourages the development of healthy eating habits in young children, to support growth and development.

Starting early with tasting, smelling and touching a range of fruits and vegetables in a relaxed way can have a huge impact on children's willingness to try new foods as they grow. Encouraging children to eat well and learn about food in their early years not only protects their health when they are young, but also sets the foundation for their future health and wellbeing. There are criteria to guide childcare providers to achieve the HEY award. The guidance is flexible, as every setting is different, and there is no set time scale from applying for the award to completing it.

Darlington College childcare centre achieved the HEY catering award in October 2022. A spokesperson said: "We wanted to have a focus on healthy lifestyles and working toward the achievement was exciting and is now something we are very proud of."


